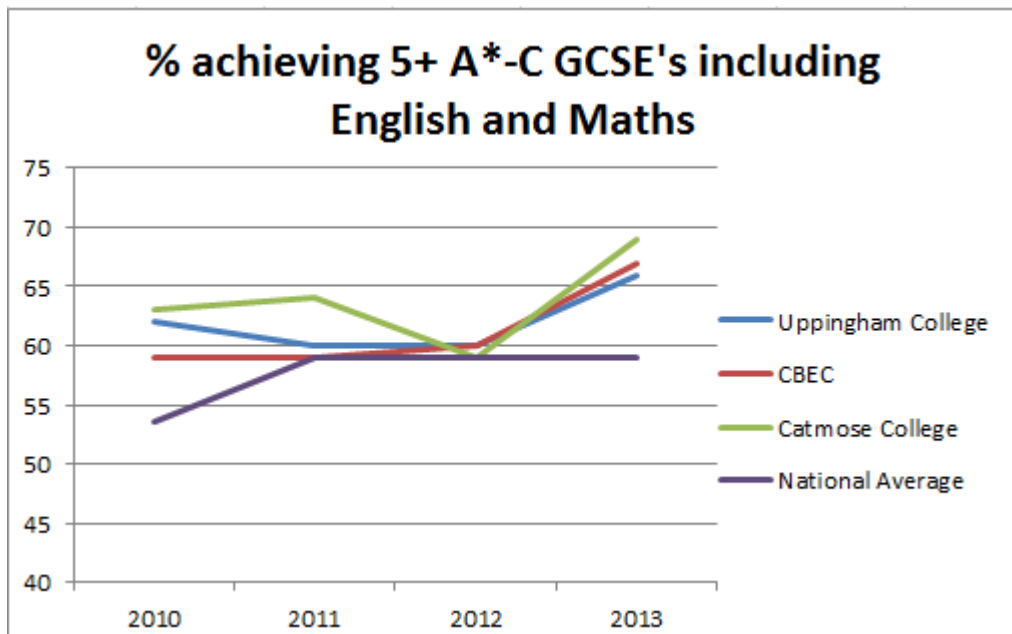
3. KEY STAGE 4 RESULTS

3.1 Individual Schools

Results for Key Stage 4 for Rutland have now been released. A summary of each schools performance, compared with last year is as follows:

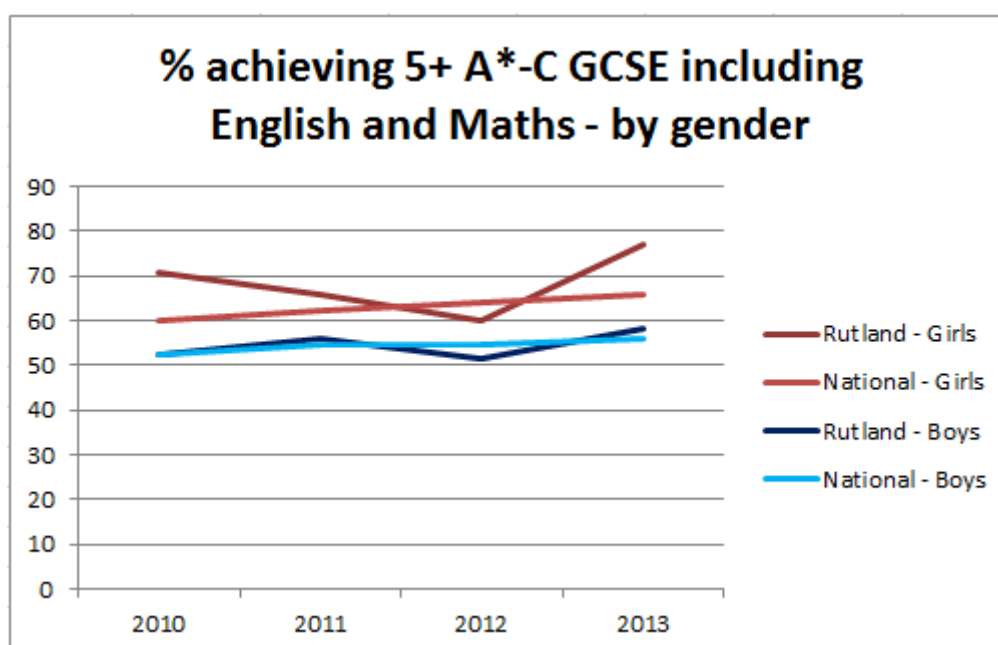

3.2 Spilt by Gender:

58.4% of boys achieved 5+ A*-C including English and Maths , compared to 77.1% of girls. Looking at a split of the results for each gender group (see below) it shows that the majority (21.6%) of boys that didn't achieve this passed Maths and at least 3 other subjects but not English.

The table below compares pass rates for boys and girls in Rutland with the national average and shows there has been an improvement for both in the last year:



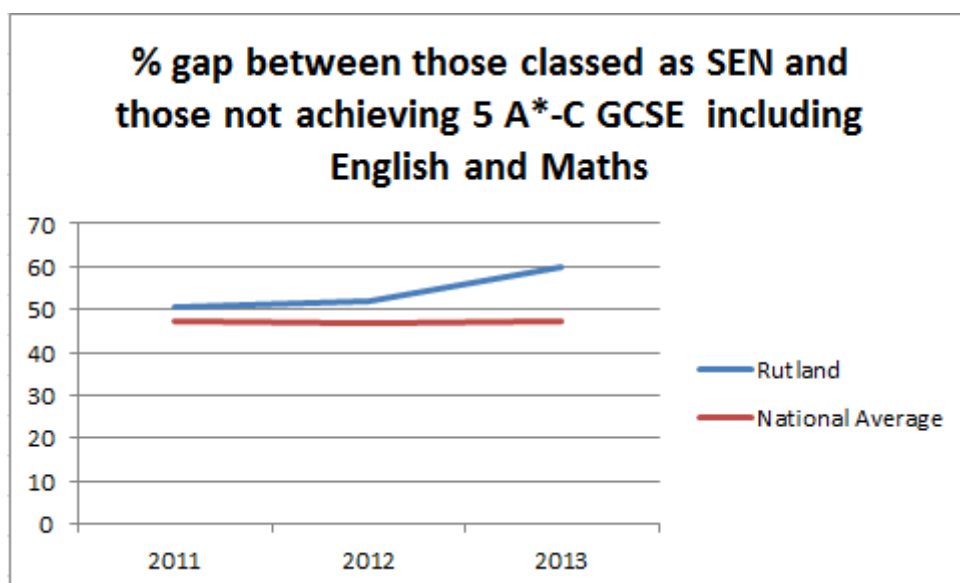
3.3 Free School Meals

41.8% of those eligible for FSM6 achieved 5+ A*-C including English and Maths at GCSE in Rutland, compared to 41.2% nationally. The gap between those receiving FSM and those not nationally is 26.5%, in Rutland the gap is 27.8%. The table below shows a comparison of Rutland's performance in narrowing this gap for FSM against the national average over the last 2 years (the period that FSM6 has been in place).

3.4 Special Education Needs

14% of those who are classed as SEN achieved 5+ A*-C including English and Maths at GCSE in Rutland compared to 23% nationally. The gap between those who have special educational needs and those who don't in achieving 5 A*-C including English and Maths nationally was 47%, in Rutland the gap was 60%, an increase on 2012 when the gap in Rutland was 52.1%. The graph below shows Rutland's performance in narrowing this gap against the national average over the last 3 years.
