Key Facts about CYP with SEND across LLR

- April 2020 approx. 22,000 CYP with SEND across LLR
- 13.7 % of overall school population
- Children in primary school are most likely to have support for SEN with numbers peaking at 10 years of age
- 2,313 children across LLR receive education in a special school
- 12,412 children in primary schools with SEND
- 7,513 children in secondary schools

nd Profile:

Iren with SEND - 67% male and 33% female. ASD is the primary need seen within the SEND cohort.

- of children with SEND are aged 0-11 years (primary) and 43% 12-17 years (secondary and Post 16). 4% of county children in primary and 25% in secondary.
- children in Rutland schools with EHCPs, 636 with SEN support. 34.7% in receipt of Pupil Premium and 12. n receipt of free school meals. (Spring Census 2020)
- ently 250 children with an EHCP, increase of 22% in last 3 years.
- NAs requests have doubled in a year. Currently 34 requests for assessments, with a marked increase in ntal requests.
- hildren with an EHCP living in Rutland attend an out of county special school: 4-10yrs (16), 11-15yrs (30) a s to 23yrs (9)
- than 2% of post 16 with an EHCP are NEET.
- It increase in SEND Case officer capacity (3.6fte) and maintained EP capacity (0.6fte)

ice Priorities: Improve quality of EHCPs outcomes, build confidence in inclusion in our mainstream provis 25years, joint commissioning between LA and Health.

Partnership Commissioning

ocal authorities and clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) must make joint commissioning arrangements for education, health and care provision for children and young people with SEN or disabilities (Section 26 of the Act).

loint commissioning should be informed by a clear assessment of local needs. Health and Wellbeing Boards are required to develop Joint Strategic Needs Assessments and Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategies, to support prevention, identification, assessment and early intervention and a joined-up approach



Joint Collaborative Commissioning Strategy

- Establishment of Joint Commissioning Strategy and Transformation Group
- The purpose of the Joint Strategic Planning and Transformation Group is for the CCG, Childrens and Family Services and Public Health to work together at a System level:
- To align commissioning priorities and explore joint commissioning opportunities
- To identify opportunities for collaboration and transformation in service design and delivery
- To advice on Commissioning Proposals developed within other working groups in the STP meetings structure
- Development of a collaborative Vision for SEND across LLR:
- "we will work together across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland to improve the outcomes for children and young people with SEND"
